JANUARY IS 'COACHES VS. CANCER' MONTH IN INDIANA FOR HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL

The IBCA again has designated January as "Coaches vs. Cancer" month for high school Basketball in Indiana. In the first three years of this initiative, boys' and girls' coaches across Indiana raised more than \$230,000. In 2010-11 coaches, teams and communities stepped up to raise \$130,000. That makes the four-year total from Indiana basketball coaches more than \$360,000.

The American Cancer Society also has designated Jan. 27-29 as "Suits & Sneakers Weekend" as part of the 2011-12 "Coaches vs. Cancer" effort. If those dates work for you, that is terrific. If not, please pick a date that works for you and host a "Coaches vs. Cancer" game.

The American Cancer Society also will present banners to programs that meet certain levels of donations. Categories are Champion (\$10,000 or more), MVP (\$5,000 to \$9,999) and All Star (\$2,500 to \$4,999).

The Indiana All-Stars enjoyed another good year both on and off the court.

On the court, the boys swept the Kentucky stars and the girls earned a split. Off the court, we received solid support from our sponsors and fans. With the help of our individual and corporate donors, we enjoyed a comfortable balance sheet financially. We had two of our best crowds ever at the Junior/Senior exhibition games at Kokomo and Washington. When we factor in our crowd at Conesco Fieldhouse, our overall attendance has increased three years in a row.

The All-Star Shootout continues to be the catalyst for the solid footing we now enjoy at the box office. We couldn't possibly do it without the help of Steve Witty and the IBCA. There were 48 teams participating at Ben Davis on game day. That not only gives the game with Kentucky at Conesco Fieldhouse a boost at the gate, it also provides a great experience for the schools involved.

As we move forward, we can expect some changes in the games -- the majority of them will be very positive. One such change is Dave Slattery (Kentucky's game director) is working on moving the game in Louisville from Bellarmine to the Yum! Center.

Lastly, and most importantly, we can't continue to be productive on game day without the quality talent and coaches that Indiana brings to the table every year. This is a direct result of all of the hard work you do with your players.

NFHS COACH OF THE YEAR NOMINEES

Mike Hackett of Munster and Julie Shelton of Mt. Vernon (Fortville) have been chosen as Indiana's nominees for the National Federation of State High School Associations national basketball coaches of the year.



Hackett, a graduate of Michigan City Elston High School and Franklin College, guided his Munster boys to a 25-1 record in 2010-11 that included sectional, regional and Northwest Crossroads Conference championships. He also was an IBCA District 1 Coach of the Year and was chosen as head coach of the 2011 Indiana Boys All-Stars.

In 11 seasons with the Mustangs, Hackett's record is 210-52.

His teams have won three consecutive sectionals and regionals in two of the past three seasons. They also were Black Division champions of the Lake Conference in 2004 as well as co-champions of that league in 2006 and 2007. The Mustangs won their fourth consecutive Northwest Crossroads Conference crown this season; Munster is the league's only champion since it was formed in 2007-08.

Hackett previously was an assistant at Kankakee Valley and Merrillville before accepting the Munster job in 2000-01. He was named IBCA District 1 Coach of the Year in 2003 and the Gary Post-Tribune Coach of the Year in 2009.



Shelton, a graduate of Seymour High School and Butler University, was picked as an NFHS nominee after guiding her Marauders to a 21-2 season that included a sectional title and the championship of the Hoosier Heritage Conference. She was chosen an IBCA District 2 Coach of the Year and the ICGSA District 4 Coach of the Year in 2010-11.

As a player, Shelton was Seymour's all-time leading scorer (1,564) and rebounder (912) en route to becoming a 1989 Indiana All-Star. At Butler, she scored a school-record 2,018 points, was a four-time first-team all-conference player and was 1993 Midwestern Collegiate Conference Player of the Year. She still owns multiple game, season and career records.

After college, Shelton became a teacher and coach at Mt. Vernon, initially serving as a basketball assistant and head volleyball coach. She was named the basketball head coach for the 1998-99 season guided the Marauders to HHC titles in 2000 and 2001. During Shelton's tenure, MV also previously won sectionals in 2003 and 2005 plus a regional in 2005.

Shelton previously was the IBCA District 4 Coach of the Year in 2000, and she was head coach for the Indiana Girls All-Stars in 2006. In 13 seasons at MV, her teams have produced a 192-92 record.

2011 COACHING CHANGES

From the end of last season through late September, 160 people have been hired as new varsity basketball coaches in Indiana high schools -- 78 to boys' basketball positions and 82 to girls' basketball positions -- for the 2011-12 season.

The number of changes is almost identical to the total of the 2010 off-season, but the total is well short of the 188 changes made in the spring and summer of 2007.

According to data compiled by HickoryHusker.com, here are the number of changes for the 13 years prior to the 2011 off-season: 2010 - 162; 2009 - 146; 2008 - 148; 2007 - 188; 2006 - 152; 2005 - 146; 2004 - 147; 2003 - 141; 2002 - 135; 2001 - 139; 2000 - 125; 1999 - 129; 1998 - 133.

Boys

Class 4A: J.R. Holmes, Bloomington South.

Holmes' team went 26-2 and beat Kokomo 56-42 in the state championship game. J.R. has gone 512-172 in 29 seasons at Bloomington South, and he is 655-290 overall in 41 seasons as a head coach. His team also won the 2009 Class 4A championship and was named USA Today National Coach of the Year that season. He previously coached two seasons at Tunnelton and 10 seasons at Mitchell. Holmes is a 1965 graduate of Needmore High School and a 1969 graduate of Indiana State.

Class 3A: Gene Müller, Washington.

Müller's Hatchets went 24-4 and defeated Culver Academy 61-46 in the state title game. Gene is 129-22 in six seasons at Washington and 597-250 in 36 seasons as a head coach. His team also won Class 3A titles in 2008 and 2010. He previously coached at Kankakee Valley, Vincennes Lincoln and Lafayette Jeff. Müller is a 1971 graduate of South Newton High School and a 1975 graduate of Wabash College.

Class 2A: Ed Schilling, Park Tudor.

Schilling's Panthers went 26-2 and edged Hammond Bishop Noll 43-42 in the championship game. Ed is 41-13 in two seasons at Park Tudor and 119-92 overall in nine seasons as a high school head coach (31-33 in three years at Western Boone and 47-46 in four years at Logansport). He had a 75-93 record in six seasons as coach at Wright State University. He also has been a NBA assistant for the New Jersey Nets and a college assistant at Memphis and Massachusetts. Schilling is a 1984 graduate of Lebanon High School and a 1988 graduate of Miami University in Oxford, Ohio.

Class A: Nick Reich, Indianapolis Metropolitan.

Reich's Pumas went 22-6 and topped Triton 59-55 in the final game. Reich went 49-41 in four seasons at Metropolitan and since has resigned as coach to focus on his job as director of youth services for Goodwill Industries. Reich is a 1996 graduate of Evansville Reitz High School and attended IUPUI.

Girls

Class 4A: Chad Gilbert, Jeffersonville.

Gilbert's Red Devils went 28-2 and defeated Penn 43-29 in the state championship game. Chad's record in 11 seasons with the Jeff girls was 220-43, including seven Hoosier Hills Conference and six sectional crowns. After the season, Gilbert was hired to become coach of the Jeffersonville boys' team for 2011-12. Gilbert previously was a boys' assistant for two years, one each at Evansville Central and Perry Central. He also was head coach at River Valley Middle School in Jeffersonville for two years. Gilbert is a 1991 graduate of Charlestown High School and a 1996 graduate of the University of Southern Indiana.

Class 3A: Bruce Dockery, Evansville Memorial.

Dockery's Tigers went 28-1 and outlasted Benton Central 58-50 in overtime to win the state title. Dockery's teams have gone 388-131 in 23 seasons at Memorial, where he also serves as athletic director. Dockery is a 1969 graduate of Evansville Bosse High School and a 1978 graduate of the University of Southern Indiana.

Class 2A: Denny Renier, Fort Wayne Bishop Luers.

Renier's Knights went 24-2 and beat Brownstown Central 59-46 in the title game. Renier is 42-10 in two seasons at Luers after serving 22 years as an assistant coach at the school. He is a 1961 graduate of New Haven High School.

Class A: Tim Young, Vincennes Rivet.

Young's Patriots went 28-0 and topped Turkey Run 49-40. Young's teams have gone 96-7 in his four seasons with the Patriots. His teams were Class A state runner-up in 2009 and 2010. 2011-12 NFHS RULE CHANGES

Penalties for fouls during throw-ins have been changed in high school basketball, effective with the 2011-12 season, the National Federation of State High School Associations announced in its basketball rule changes news release in May. The throw-in revision, as well as several other rules changes and editorial revisions, were approved by the NFHS Rules Committee at its April 11-13 meeting in Indianapolis. All rules changes recommended by the committee were subsequently approved by the NFHS Board of Directors.

Definitions within Rules 4-12-1, 4-12-2 and 4-12-6 were changed to reflect that team control will now exist during a throw-in once the thrower-in has the ball at his or her disposal. The new rule will no longer grant free throws to the defending team in the bonus if the throw-in team commits a foul.

"The advantage was too great because the throw-in team would lose possession and yield free throws under the previous rule," said Mary Struckhoff, NFHS assistant director and liaison to the Basketball Rules Committee at the time (she has since resigned her position). "It was inconsistent with how this same play was being administered during non-throw-in situations."

The committee also approved an editorial change to Rule 9-2-10, Penalty 4 to clarify that when an opponent contacts the thrower-in, an intentional foul will be charged to the offender. The defender will not have to have broken the plane to be charged with an intentional foul.

The committee edited Rule 1-3-1 to reflect the current basketball court design, which many high schools already use. The rule now permits at minimum a quarter-inch-wide single line and a line no wider than 2 inches for the center circle.

The committee also added Rule 3-5-3, which provides guidelines for arm compression sleeves. Sleeves may be white, black, beige or a single solid school color, and all sleeves must be the same color for each team member. Also, any manufacturer's logos must not exceed 2.25 inches square.

In addition to the throw-in change to Rule 9-2-10, the committee approved several other editorial revisions, including reorganizing the definition of an intentional foul, clarifying when an alternating-possession throw-in shall be administered and clarifying penalty administration for when single fouls occur as part of a multiple free-throw situation.

Two other editorial changes to the Basketball Rules Book are ones that the NFHS Board of Directors has approved for use in all NFHS rules books. The first rule extends the clerical duties of officials beyond the end of the game through the completion of any reports required from actions that occurred while the officials had jurisdiction. The second authorizes state associations to grant exceptions to NFHS playing rules for participants with disabilities, special needs or extenuating circumstances.

Struckhoff said the committee again discussed requiring the use of a shot clock in high school basketball, as it has done for several years, but the committee did not approve the proposal.

"Even though there's growing interest in using a shot clock, the general sense from the committee is that the time isn't right," Struckhoff said. "Given the current economic climate, it would be difficult for schools to comply with a rule requiring purchasing new equipment and hiring additional table personnel."
