FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

It's that time of the year again.

Each season, players, coaches and the school community begin a new journey together. Teaching and coaching is a great profession that provides opportunities for many men and women to make a difference in the lives of the student-athletes we serve by helping them grow through their involvement in the game of basketball. Hopefully when the season ends, beyond the wins and losses, it was a memorable season for everyone involved.



This past year has brought some changes and potential changes to our great game.

As most of you know, our compromise tournament proposal was not accepted. Instead, the IHSAA created a task force to study the issue and present another proposal to the full IHSAA Board of Directors for consideration. The board's decision on the task force's proposal is expected sometime in November.

The length of quarters in Junior Varsity games was increased to seven minutes, and, if schools choose to do so, each may add two games to its schedule.

In an effort to bring the Girls' Basketball State Finals back to Indianapolis, the IHSAA decided to begin the Girls' Basketball season one week earlier (beginning in 2015-16). By starting one week earlier, this creates an overlap with the volleyball season. The IBCA is continuing to look at potential ways to address this issue.

Thanks to Charlie Hall, Pay McKee, Beth DeVinney and Mike Broughton, the Indiana-Kentucky All-Star series and the national Rising Senior Academy event once again were a huge success. More than \$35,000 was raised for charity through the All-Star series.

The Indiana-Kentucky Challenge Cup got off to a good start this past season with five Indiana schools participating against five Kentucky schools in a day of competition at Freedom Hall in Louisville. Special thanks to Tom Beach and Aaron Garrett for their efforts in organizing this event. More information about this year's games is featured in this E-newsletter.

Under the leadership of Marty Johnson, Renee Turpa, Kathie Layden and the coaches who took time from their busy schedules to participate, the Boys' and Girls' Top 100 Underclass Showcases were successful again for the 12th year.

Special thanks to Chris Benedict and Tom Beach for their work in putting together the IBCA Tournament proposal that was presented to the IHSAA. Even though we did not have the result that we would have liked, it was not because of any lack of effort or preparation on their part. They represented the IBCA in a first-class fashion.

For this season, we hope everyone will continue to be involved with the "Coaches vs. Cancer" program during the month of January. To date, more than \$680,000 has been raised over the past seven years by participating Indiana basketball programs.

Also in January, you will be receiving a mailing with numerous nomination forms. Please make sure to meet the deadlines. You must be an IBCA member to nominate anyone for postseason awards. Please do not eliminate a deserving student-athlete for postseason recognition because you missed the deadlines or forgot to join your professional organization.

In closing, I wanted to provide another copy to you of a memo that Marty Johnson, Mike Hackett and I issued to IBCA member coaches in late August. If you have any questions about those topics, please let me know.

AUG. 25 MEMO TO IBCA MEMBER COACHES

We wanted to take this opportunity to communicate with you about a couple of basketball issues and misconceptions that have arisen over the past few months.

1. Moving of Girls Basketball Season starting date

We knew the IHSAA leadership was having discussion on this topic, and we expressed the membership's overwhelming support with regard to how such a move would allow the Girls Basketball State Finals to be played in Indianapolis.

The IBCA, however, at no time proposed that we move the start of the Girls Basketball season without addressing the overlap (or potential overlap) with volleyball. The first the IBCA knew of the adopted change (start of girls basketball without a corresponding change to the end of volleyball) was when it was released by the IHSAA. We are working with our membership and others to address this issue.

2. The Basketball Tournament proposal

For the past two years, an IBCA Committee has been working on a proposal to address issues that our membership communicated to us with regard to the State Basketball Tournament (boys and girls).

When that proposal was presented to the IHSAA, it was tabled before a vote could take place. Instead, the IHSAA Board of Directors formed a Task Force with the charge of reviewing the IBCA proposal and subsequently submitting its own proposal to the full IHSAA board.

It is the Task Force's proposal that will be voted on by the IHSAA on October 2, not a proposal put forth by the IBCA.

There are some components in the Task Force's proposal that the IBCA had addressed in our earlier proposal and we believe will make our tournament better. However, the Task Force's proposal was not submitted by the IBCA.

The process for change is a long and, at times, frustrating endeavor. We will continue to strive to communicate your thoughts and appreciate your input into any future proposal ideas.

IBCA ALL-STATE TEAMS FOR 2014-15

The IBCA has decided to upgrade the organization's All-State honors program for the 2014-15 season.

The organization still will recognize top players from across the state – boys and girls – with Senior All-State and Underclass All-State accolades. In total, there are four groups of honorees – Boys Senior All-State, Boys Underclass All-State, Girls Senior All-State and Girls Underclass All-State.

Like in the past, the IBCA will use two 22-member panels of coaches (one panel for boys, one panel for girls) to identify All-State candidates and collect information about them. The panel members then will forward that information to a committee chairman for compilation. The respective full committees will meet in March to discuss candidates and vote to select players for various honors.

The IBCA All-State Teams will be announced shortly after those meetings (March 9 for girls, March 24 for boys).

Unlike last season and the past several seasons, when only two levels were chosen within each grouping (a 15-member First-Team All-State Team and an Honorable Mention All-State list of about 120 players), the new format for 2014-15 will include the following sets within each All-State group:

- IBCA Supreme 15 All-State (top 15 players, regardless of the class of a player's school, taking the place of the old "First-Team All-State")
- IBCA Large School All-State (15 players from Class 3A and Class 4A schools, not on the Supreme 15)
- IBCA Small School All-State (15 players from Class A and Class 2A schools, not on the Supreme 15)
- An Honorable Mention All-State list of about 85 players.

With the new format, there will be four levels that each senior or each underclass player could be designated within the IBCA's All-State program.

1. IBCA Senior Boys Supreme 15 All-State, IBCA Senior Boys Large School All-State, IBCA Senior Boys Small School All-State and IBCA Senior Boys Honorable Mention All-State.
2. IBCA Underclass Boys Supreme 15 All-State, IBCA Underclass Boys Large School All-State, IBCA Underclass Boys Small School All-State and IBCA Underclass Boys Honorable Mention All-State.
3. IBCA Senior Girls Supreme 15 All-State, IBCA Senior Girls Large School All-State, IBCA Senior Girls Small School All-State and IBCA Senior Girls Honorable Mention All-State.
4. IBCA Underclass Girls Supreme 15 All-State, IBCA Underclass Girls Large School All-State, IBCA Underclass Girls Small School All-State and IBCA Underclass Girls Honorable Mention All-State.

Ultimately, approximately 260 boys and 260 girls will receive honors through this process. That will be 130 seniors and 130 underclass players per gender.

Subway Restaurants of Indiana have partnered with the IBCA the past two years and served as the title sponsor of the IBCA/Subway All-State Teams. IBCA leaders are hopeful that discussions with Subway leadership will result in that partnership being continued for 2014-15.

David Wood of West Lafayette is the chairman of the IBCA's Boys' All-State committee. Pat McKee of Columbus North is chairman of the IBCA's Girls' All-State committee.

Each committee consists of 22 coaches from across the state. Sixteen coaches represent regional areas from across the state with the charge of identifying top players from approximately 25 schools each in most cases. Six coaches represent the three IHSAA districts, one east and one west from each district. They have the specific charge of identifying top players from Class A and Class 2A schools in this process.

Both committee lists will be posted when they are finalized on the IBCA web site so that coaches from all schools will know which committee member represents their school in the player-identification process.



INDIANA-KENTUCKY CHALLENGE CUP

The IBCA calendar in 2014-15 again will include the Indiana-Kentucky Challenge Cup, a five-game event between teams from Indiana and Kentucky.

The second Challenge Cup will be Jan. 10 at New Castle Fieldhouse in New Castle, Ind. Teams representing Indiana are Homestead (girls), South Knox, Scecina, Hamilton Heights and Zionsville.

The event is being coordinated by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association and the Kentucky Association of Basketball Coaches.

The schedule for the day is:

Girls: Homestead vs. Elizabethtown, 11 a.m.

Boys: South Knox vs. Newport Central Catholic, about 1 p.m.

Boys: Scecina vs. Pulaski Southwestern, about 3 p.m.

Boys: Hamilton Heights vs. Wayne County, about 5 p.m.

Boys: Zionsville vs. Scott County, about 7 p.m.

Kentucky prevailed in last season's inaugural challenge, winning four games to Indiana's one, that was played in Freedom Hall in Louisville. Last year's event raised \$12,000 for charities, including the Wounded Warrior Program as well as the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame and the Kentucky High School Basketball Hall of Fame.

Admission is \$10.00 per person for the entire day of games. Military service veterans and their immediate families will be admitted at no charge. Tickets will be available from participating schools or on game day at Freedom Hall.

A best-of-five-game format will determine the winner of the 2015 Challenge Cup. The 10 participating teams feature multiple NCAA Division I prospects.

Plans are for this event to be hosted at a Kentucky site in January 2016. It then will continue to rotate between the states following years.

Proceeds from the 2015 inaugural event again will go to the Wounded Warrior Program as well as the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame and the Kentucky High School Basketball Hall of Fame.



The Indiana All-Stars are alive and well despite what some would have our fans believe.

Growing our crowd from 5,095 in 2008 to 6,250 for the All-Star double-header against Kentucky in Bankers Life Fieldhouse in 2014, to go along with our boys and girls consistently beating Kentucky is a GOOD thing.

This is the message that we need to get out as we continue to bring people back to the games.

The Indiana National Guard, the IBCA Scholarship Fund and the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame are among the beneficiaries of the game's continued growth. We were able to make significant donations to all three groups. This growth has been a direct result of Steve Witty and the IBCA's administrating the games the last few years.

The "All-Star Game Day Shootout" has gone from 24 teams in 2009 to 84 teams this past June. We not only are growing the participation level, we are making it even better. We will release a form in the IBCA's spring e-newsletter that will allow you to sign up for this package.

For families with children, we had goals set up in the Bankers Life Fieldhouse pavilion so youngsters could shoot for a T-shirt. Also, Freddy Fever was in attendance to offer additional game-day entertainment. We are going to continue to improve the game-day experience.

I am really excited about the direction we're headed, and, as always, we appreciate the IBCA's efforts as an organization.

JANUARY IS 'COACHES VS. CANCER' MONTH

The IBCA again has designated January as "Coaches vs. Cancer" month for high school Basketball in Indiana. In the first seven years of this initiative, boys' and girls' coaches across Indiana raised nearly \$700,000. In 2013-14 coaches, teams and communities that reported raised \$72,000. That makes the seven-year total from Indiana basketball coaches more than \$680,000 (\$680,446 thru spring 2014).

For 2014-15, ideally pick a date in January for a "Coaches vs. Cancer" game. If not January, please pick a date that works for you and host a "Coaches vs. Cancer" game.

The American Cancer Society also will present banners to programs that meet certain levels of donations. Categories are Champion (\$10,000 or more), MVP (\$5,000 to \$9,999) and All Star (\$2,500 to \$4,999).

This January, we are asking every IBCA boys' and girls' coach to select a game to promote "Coaches vs. Cancer."

All participating schools will be recognized this year on www.coachesvscancerindiana.org; those raising a total of \$2,500 or more through all sports will receive a "Coaches vs. Cancer" recognition banner imprinted with the school's name. To be eligible, all funds raised from throughout the school year must be turned into the local American Cancer Society office no later than June 1, 2015.

"We are very proud of Indiana high schools," said American Cancer Society Coaches vs. Cancer specialist Kim Hoffman, who helps coordinate the IBCA initiative while overseeing ACS efforts in Indiana, Illinois and Michigan. "And we are extremely proud of our partnership with the IBCA in this extraordinary campaign.

"The commitment of the coaches, teams, parents and participants makes a real impact in the lives of those touched by the disease. We are truly grateful for the continued support. By working together, we can all join the team to create a world with less cancer and more birthdays."

During this game, we are asking you to pass a container through the crowd (or make one available at your ticket counter) for fans to make donations. 2014-15 NEW COACHES

From the beginning of last season through September 2014, 190 people have been hired as new varsity basketball coaches in Indiana high schools -- 92 to boys' basketball positions and 98 to girls' basketball positions -- for the 2014-15 season.

The number of changes is the greatest number over the past 17 years. In the spring and summer of 2007, there were 188 changes made.

According to data compiled by the IBCA and HickoryHusker.com, here are the number of changes for the 16 years prior to the 2014 offseason: 2013 - 138; 2012 - 167; 2011 - 154; 2010 - 162; 2009 - 146; 2008 - 148; 2007 - 188; 2006 - 152; 2005 - 146; 2004 - 147; 2003 - 141; 2002 - 135; 2001 - 139; 2000 - 125; 1999 - 129; 1998 - 133.

NCAA DIVISION I ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS FOR CLASS OF 2016 AND BEYOND

The NCAA has released an SAT/ACT sliding scale that corresponds with the increased GPA requirements for the class of 2016 and beyond. Any current high school freshman, sophomore or junior who is even remotely considering the possibility of playing a sport collegiately needs to pay attention. The wiggle room to correct academic shortcomings has been greatly reduced.

Here is a summary of the NCAA Division I academic requirements for a Full Qualifier that take effect for the class of 2016 and beyond:

- The minimum core course GPA has increased from 2.00 to 2.30.
- 10 of the 16 core course requirements must be satisfied prior to the start of the senior year.
- 7 of those 10 core courses must be from English, Math and Science subsections.
- Grades earned in the 10 core courses are "locked in" for the purposes of calculating the final core course GPA.
- Any retakes of the first 10 core courses must be completed prior to senior year.

The NCAA also has introduced a new status for the class of 2015 – the "Academic Redshirt." An "Academic Redshirt" may receive a scholarship and practice with his/her team, but he/she may not participate in game competition as a college freshman. Students with a GPA of 2.30 or above may achieve either "Academic Redshirt" or "Full Qualifier" status, depending on their SAT/ACT test scores. Students with a core course GPA between 2.00 and 2.29 cannot attain "Full Qualifier" status but may achieve "Academic Redshirt" status by meeting minimum sliding scale test score requirements.

The new sliding SAT/ACT score results in significant changes in minimum test score requirements. The minimum SAT score required to compete as a college freshman increased by 180 points while the minimum ACT score increased by an average of 14 points (sum score).

Here are two examples of changes to the new sliding scale:

Example 1

Prior to 2016: 2.00 core course GPA + 1010 SAT or 86 ACT = Full Qualifier
2016 and after: 2.00 core course GPA + 1020 SAT or 86 ACT = Academic Redshirt

Example 2

Prior to 2016: 2.50 core course GPA + 820 SAT or 68 ACT = Full Qualifier
2016 and after: 2.50 core course GPA + 1000 SAT or 85 ACT = Full Qualifier

Remember, the NCAA does not include the writing component of the SAT or ACT and the ACT score is a sum score (not average) of the English, math, reading and science sections.

Finally, just because a student-athlete meets the minimum NCAA academic standards, it does not mean they will be admitted to play sports at the college of their choice. Many universities have academic standards for incoming freshman athletes that are higher than the NCAA minimum requirements.

What does all this mean? Student-athletes must start tracking courses early. A student-athlete should calculate his/her initial core course GPA at the conclusion of his/her first semester in high school and continue to do so each semester thereafter.

Now more than ever, every semester counts.

What to do if involved in a suit?

Camp coverage, certificates of insurance, participant/accident insurance?

This policy will protect the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association and its active members who are high school coaches, junior high coaches or elementary coaches from claims made by negligent acts accidentally committed resulting in bodily injury, personal and advertising injury or property damage to others.

Carrier: Lexington Insurance Company; Excess Surplus Lines ("A" A.M. Best)

Policy period: Aug. 1, 2014 through Aug. 1, 2015

Limits of insurance: \$1,000,000, each occurrence; \$1,000,000, general aggregate (per member); \$1,000,000, products/completed operations; \$1,000,000, personal/advertising injury; \$50,000, fire damage; excluded, medical payments.

Camp coverage: Please note that our General Liability Program follows all members while working at camps and/or conducting their own personal camp. In addition, Participant/Accident Coverage is available that will cover coaches and/or participants. Should an accident occur during your camp, clinic or event, this secondary coverage could help offset the loss suffered by families affected by such accidents.

Certificate of Insurance & Participant Accident: If you have a camp and require proof of insurance, certificates are available at no additional charge. If you have a camp and require a certificate of insurance naming an Additional Insured, the cost is \$150.00. Participant/Accident Coverage must be in place for all participants prior to the issuance of a certificate of insurance naming an Additional Insured. Certificates of Insurance and Participant/Accident request forms are available through the IBCA.

NFHS COACH OF THE YEAR NOMINEES

Pat Rady of Cloverdale and **Terry Minix** of Oregon-Davis have been chosen as Indiana's nominees for the National Federation of State High School Associations national basketball coaches of the year.



Rady completed his 50th season as a varsity coach in 2013-14 by leading Cloverdale to a 19-2 record. In 50 seasons, he has compiled a 739-415 record, including a 121-101 mark over the past 10 seasons with the Clovers.

Rady began his career as eighth-grade coach for one season at Scribner Junior High in New Albany. He then coached five seasons at Bainbridge (83-33), five years at Winchester (79-33), one year at Southmont (9-12), five years at Shelbyville (72-56), 24 years at Terre Haute South (375-180) and the past 10 seasons at Cloverdale.

His teams have won 19 sectionals, eight regionals and one semistate. He was the Indiana All-Star coach in 1989 and has been inducted into the Hanover College, Indiana Basketball, Terre Haute South and Montgomery County halls of fame.

Rady is a 1959 graduate of Roachdale High School and a 1963 graduate of Hanover College. He earned a master's degree from Indiana State in 1970. He and his wife, Margaret, have two sons and three grandchildren.



Minix guided the Oregon-Davis girls to a 23-2 campaign last season, including the Class A state championship. In 21 seasons with the Bobcats, Minix's teams have gone 313-146 with eight sectional, two regional, two semistate and two state championships. OD's previous state crown came in 2007.

Minix is a 1980 graduate of Oregon-Davis and attended Bethel College in Mishawaka, where he played basketball for three seasons. He was an OD assistant coach for two seasons before becoming the Bobcats' head coach.

Minix and his wife, Cheryl, have three daughters -- Aubrey, 24, Gabrielle, 22, and Lexi, 16. All three daughters played for Coach Minix.

2013-14 BOYS CHAMPIONSHIP COACHES



Class 4A: Jason Delaney, Indianapolis Tech. Delaney led the Titans to the Class 4A state championship with a 63-59 victory over Lake Central. Delaney's teams are 64-12 during his tenure at Tech, including a 27-2 mark in 2013-14. In 10 seasons as a head coach, his career record is 145-90. Delaney is a 1995 graduate of Lafayette Central Catholic and a 2001 graduate of Ball State University. He previously was a head coach at Waldron for one year (winning a Class A state title), Southport for four seasons, Anderson Highland for one season and Indianapolis Washington for one season. He also served as an assistant coach at Muncie Burris.

Class 3A: Stacy Meyer, Greensburg. Meyer guided the Pirates to a 28-1 season, including an 89-76 win over Bowman Academy for the 3A state title. Meyer has a record of 146-48 in eight seasons at Greensburg and is 204-104 in 13 seasons as a head coach. A graduate of Greensburg and Hanover College, he previously was head coach at Southwestern (Shelby) and Whiteland.



Class 2A: Kyle Cox, Park Tudor. Cox directed the Panthers to a 24-4 record and the Class 2A title in his first season as a head coach, beating Westview 84-57 in the final. Cox is a 2002 graduate of Blue River Valley High School and a 2006 graduate of Ball State University. He was an assistant coach for two years at BRV, one year at Winchester and four years at Park Tudor before becoming the Panthers' head coach. Cox participated in the State Finals as a player in 2001 and also as an assistant coach in 2010, 2011 and 2012.

Class A: Donovan Garletts, Marquette Catholic. Garletts guided the Blazers to a 20-6 season, including a 70-66 victory over Barr-Reeve in overtime for the Class A championship. Garletts has a 55-38 in four seasons at Marquette Catholic. He is a 2005 graduate of Crown Point High School and a 2008 graduate of Indiana University. He previously was an assistant coach at Bloomington South for three seasons and was a part of its staff when it won the 4A title in 2009.



2013-14 GIRLS CHAMPIONSHIP COACHES



Class 4A: Damon Bailey, Bedford North Lawrence. Bailey directed the Lady Stars to a 27-1 record in his only season as head coach, capped by a 51-41 victory over Penn for the 4A championship. He resigned his position at the end of the season to become a women's basketball assistant coach at Butler University. Bailey was a legendary player, leading BNL to the 1990 boys' state title and setting the state's all-time scoring record with 3,134 points. He was an All-American player at Indiana University and played professionally for several years. He started his coaching career as the BNL boys' head coach, compiling a 23-19 mark in two seasons. He returned to the BNL bench as a girls' basketball assistant for four seasons prior to taking over as head coach in 2013-14.

Class 3A: Chris Keisling, Western. Keisling guided the Panthers to a 23-3 season, including a 38-35 decision over Evansville Mater Dei for the 3A state title. He compiled a 61-15 in three seasons at Western, stepping down from coaching at the conclusion of the season. He previously was a boys basketball head coach at Tri-County (1991-95) and Northfield (1995-98) and owns a boys-girls combined career mark of 146-62. Keisling is a 1982 graduate of North Miami High School and a 1985 graduate of Ball State University. He started his coaching career as a boys basketball assistant at Eastern (Greentown) for one year and Delta for two years.



Class 2A: Rick Risinger, Heritage Christian. Risinger has coached the Eagles for nine seasons, including a 27-1 mark in 2013-14 and a 64-61 win over Fort Wayne Canterbury for the 2A state crown. He has a career record of 203-37, including previous 2A state titles in 2006, 2007, 2008 and 2009. Risinger was an Indiana All-Star player in 1969 for Richmond High School, then played four years of basketball at Purdue. He became coach at Heritage Christian in 2005 and the Eagles have won seven sectionals, six regionals, five semistate and five state titles during his tenure.

Class A: Terry Minix, Oregon-Davis. Minix directed the Bobcats to a 23-2 season, including a 69-64 victory over Vincennes Rivet for the Class A state championship. Minix has coached Oregon-Davis for 21 seasons, compiling a 313-146 during his tenure that includes eight sectionals, two regionals, two semistates and two state titles. The previous state win came in 2007. Minix is a 1980 graduate of Oregon-Davis and attended Bethel College in Mishawaka, where he played basketball for three seasons. He was an OD assistant coach for two seasons before becoming the Bobcats' head coach.



NFHS RULE CHANGES FOR 2014-15

Players in marked lane spaces will be able to move into the lane when the ball is released by the free-throw shooter beginning with the 2014-15 high school basketball season. Previously, players could not release until the ball touched the ring or backboard or until the free throw ended.

This change in Rule 9-1-4 was one of four major rules changes recommended by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Basketball Rules Committee at its April 14-16 meeting in Indianapolis. All recommendations were subsequently approved by the NFHS Board of Directors.

The committee noted that the current rule of players in marked lane spaces not releasing until the ball touches the ring or backboard creates two obstacles for officials: 1) attempting to watch the ball strike the ring or backboard while simultaneously attempting to observe if any players/free thrower violate the lane-line restrictions, and 2) insufficient time for the perimeter official(s) to obtain optimum angles on the players involved in rebounding a missed try.

"In recent years, we have moved players along the lane spaces up and removed excess players along the lane lines, so the rationale for changing this rule to its current status is no longer an issue," said Theresia Wynns, NFHS director of sports and officials education and staff liaison to the NFHS Basketball Rules Committee.

In an effort to eliminate excessive contact on ball-handlers and dribblers outside of the lane area, the committee added Article 12 to Rule 10-6 on contact. As a result, the following acts will constitute a foul when committed against a ball-handler/dribbler: 1) placing two hands on the player, 2) placing an extended arm bar on the player, 3) placing and keeping a hand on the player and 4) contacting the player more than once with the same hand or alternating hands.

The rules committee also expanded the definition of an intentional foul in Rule 4-19-3d, which now states that an intentional foul is "excessive contact with an opponent while the ball is live or until an airborne shooter returns to the floor."

Wynns said that this revision will address the issue of contact with the elbow and should reduce the subjectivity in making rulings on intentional fouls.

In the final rules change, the committee expanded Rule 3-5-3 by identifying anything worn on the arm and/or leg as a sleeve, except a knee brace. These items, including tights, will now be permitted but must meet the color and logo restrictions in Rule 3-5-3. Previously, this rule permitted only arm sleeves and leg-compression sleeves.

Basketball is the second-most popular sport for girls and third-most popular for boys at the high school level, according to the 2012-13 High School Athletics Participation Survey conducted by the NFHS, with 433,120 girls and 538,676 boys participating nationwide. The sport ranks first in school sponsorship of girls and boys teams with 17,493 schools sponsoring the sport for girls and 17,856 sponsoring the sport for boys.
