2014 CLINIC FEATURE SPEAKERS

Stephanie White, Indiana Fever

Stephanie White is entering her fourth season as an assistant coach for the Indiana Fever.

The 2012 WNBA title held special meaning for White, who was one of the original Fever players in 2000 and a member of the Fever's All-Decade Team announced in 2009. She retired from playing in the WNBA following the 2004 season, and she has coached in the college or pro ranks since 2003.

White's hiring in 2011 marked the first time the Fever has hired an assistant coach with pro playing experience. White was reunited with Fever head coach Lin Dunn, the former Purdue coach who recruited White to the West Lafayette campus.

Prior to joining the Fever, White spent four seasons as an assistant coach with the Chicago Sky after previous stints as a college assistant at Ball State, Kansas State and Toledo.

White also has parlayed her playing and coaching into a prominent broadcasting career with the Big Ten Network and ESPN. She appears regularly on the BTN women's basketball studio show and provides game analysis for both networks.

After leading Purdue to a national championship in 1999 and being drafted by the Charlotte Sting, White was acquired by the Fever in a draft-day trade in December 1999 to lead her hometown team into its first season of existence. A former Indiana Miss Basketball and a Purdue All-American, White played four seasons with the Fever and five pro seasons overall. She still ranks prominently among Fever franchise leaders in games played, minutes, 3-pointers, assists, steals, 3-point percentage and free throw percentage.

Her 93 percent free throw shooting in 2003 remains a Fever record.

White's legacy as a high school and college star made her one of the state's most popular figures even before she donned a Fever uniform. Beginning with a prep career at Seeger Memorial High School, White set standards for basketball excellence while becoming an Indiana icon. She averaged 36.9 points and 13.1 rebounds as a high school senior while being named the 1995 national high school player of the year. She led Seeger to a 92-7 record over four seasons and finished her prep career with a then-Indiana record 2,869 points.

White took her game to Purdue and averaged double-figure scoring for the Boilermakers in four straight seasons. As a college senior, she averaged 20.2 points and 4.5 assists while leading Purdue to the NCAA title and earning the 1999 Wade Trophy as the national college player of the year. White finished her Boilermaker career second in school history in points and assists, and she has since been inducted into the Purdue Athletics Hall of Fame.

Greg Lansing, Indiana State University

Greg Lansing recently completed his fourth season as the men's basketball coach at Indiana State. He previously spent eight seasons with the program as an assistant coach, including the final three years as associate head coach.

Lansing has compiled a 79-55 record as boss of the Sycamores. He owns a mark of 41-31 in Missouri Valley Conference games. Lansing is 7-3 in the MVC Tournament, with three of those victories coming as the lower-seeded team. ISU has reached the NIT the past two seasons, and his 79 career victories rank in the top 10 of ISU's all-time men's basketball coaching win list.

In 2013-14, ISU went 23-11 overall, 12-6 in MVC play, advanced to the finals of the MVC Tournament and reached the postseason for the fifth consecutive season – facing Arkansas in the NIT. In 2012-13, Indiana State finished 18-15, advanced to the semifinals of the MVC Tournament and played in the NIT. In 2011-12, the Sycamores posted an 18-15 record and advanced to the CollegenInsiders.com Postseason Tournament.

Lansing burst onto the scene as a rookie head coach with the Sycamore basketball program in 2010-11 as he became just the second-ever Indiana State head coach to lead the team to the NCAA Tournament in his first season. He led the team to a 20-14 record, becoming just the 14th head coach in the history of the Missouri Valley Conference to lead a team to 20 or more victories in their first year at the helm.

Prior to joining the staff at Indiana State, Lansing was the boys' basketball coach at Roosevelt High School in Des Moines, Iowa. Roosevelt had not had a winning season in 12 years before Lansing's initial season. The Roughriders went on to have back-to-back winning seasons under Lansing's direction.

Lansing earned a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of South Dakota in 1990 and a master's degree in counseling from USD in 1992.

As a member of the Coyote basketball team, Lansing helped South Dakota reach the NCAA Division II Tournament during his junior and senior seasons, the first NCAA invitations for USD since 1954. He twice was named the South Dakota Defensive Player of the Year. He also is ranked among the USD leaders



in career assists.

Following his playing career, Lansing served as a graduate assistant coach at South Dakota for two seasons. In 1992-93 he was a full-time assistant.

Lansing's father, Dave Lansing, coached high school basketball for 33 years in Iowa. Dave Lansing was inducted into the Iowa High School Athletic Association Coaches Hall of Fame in 1999. His brother, Steve, is a high school boys' basketball head coach in Minnesota.

Lansing is married to the former Angie Menser, who is an Indiana State graduate and a former track and cross country Academic All-American for the Sycamores. Angie is a Batesville native and currently serves as ISU's senior woman administrator and athletics business manager.

Todd Lickliter, Marian University

Todd Lickliter recently completed his second season at the helm of the Marian University men's basketball program. He was named the seventh head men's basketball coach in program history on June 6, 2012.

In two seasons, Lickliter has guided the Knights to 17-13 and 16-8 overall records with 8-12 and 12-6 marks in the Crossroads League.

Lickliter came to Marian from Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, where he served one season as an assistant coach.

Prior to Miami, Lickliter amassed a 169-119 career record as head coach at the University of Iowa (2007-10) and Butler University (2001-07). He also served two stints as assistant coach at Butler (1988-89 and 1999-2001) and a stint as an assistant coach at Eastern Michigan University (1997-99).

In three seasons at the University of Iowa, Lickliter went 38-58. In six seasons at Butler, Lickliter earned a 131-61 record and led the Bulldogs to four post-season basketball tournament berths, including trips to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 2003 and 2007. Butler averaged 22 wins those six seasons, winning league titles in 2002, 2003 and 2007. The Bulldogs won four in-season tournaments, including the 2006 NIT Season Tip-Off and the 2006 Wooden Classic.

He was named the 2006-07 Division I Coach of the Year by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) and was recognized as the High-Major Coach of the Year by collegehoops.net. He was also named 2007 Horizon League Coach of the Year for the second consecutive year after guiding the Bulldogs to a school and league-record 29 victories.

Along with winning at least 20 games in four of six seasons at Butler, Lickliter's student-athletes also excelled in the classroom. Butler's graduation rate of 82 percent for men's basketball in Lickliter's final season ranked best among all Sweet Sixteen teams in the 2007 NCAA Tournament. Butler also held the top graduation rate among NCAA Sweet Sixteen teams when the Bulldogs advanced past Mississippi State and Louisville in the 2003 NCAA Tournament.

Lickliter became the first coach in Horizon League history to be honored by the NABC as Coach of the Year. He owns three of the top single-season win totals in Butler history, including 29 wins in 2007, 26 in 2002 and 27 in 2003. The Bulldogs also won 20 games in 2004.

Lickliter ranks fourth on Butler's all-time list for basketball coaching victories. He ranks second among Butler head coaches with at least three seasons in winning percentage (.682) and second in number of 20-win seasons (four). He became the first Butler coach to reach 50 career wins in just two seasons and the first to achieve 100 victories in five seasons. And, he's one of just four coaches in the history of the Horizon League to guide a team to the NCAA "Sweet Sixteen."

Lickliter began his collegiate coaching career at Butler in 1988-89 under Joe Sexson, his former college coach. He left Butler after one year to accept a head coaching job at Danville High School, where he remained for three seasons.

He returned to the collegiate ranks in 1996 as an administrative assistant on Barry Collier's staff at Butler. Lickliter accepted an assistant coaching position at Eastern Michigan in 1997 and remained on the Eagles' staff for two seasons before returning to Butler in 1999.

In addition to his collegiate coaching experience, Lickliter had high school head coaching stints at Park Tudor High School in Indianapolis (1979-87) and Danville High School (1987-88, 1989-92). He also coached a partial season in Saudi Arabia with the Ah Ahli Sports Club-Jeddah.

Lickliter, 58, has had a presence in Indiana basketball dating back to his days as a three-year starting guard at North Central High School in Indianapolis, where he played for his father, Arlan. He began his college career at North Carolina-Wilmington before transferring to Central Florida Community College. He played one season at Central Florida, earning his associate degree in 1977. He then transferred to Butler, where he played his final two collegiate seasons, 1977-79. He earned a bachelor's degree in secondary education from Butler in 1979.

Lickliter and his wife, Joez, have three adult sons – Ry, Garrett and John.

Jim Shaw, Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology

Jim Shaw has led Rose-Hulman to six NCAA Division III Tournament appearances, five regular-season conference championships and four conference tournament titles in his 20 years as head coach of the Fightin' Engineers.

Shaw most recently became the second men's basketball coach in Rose-Hulman history to win 300 games in his career, including 82 wins over the last four seasons. He now holds a 303-221 career mark.

The recent run of success includes NCAA Division III Tournament appearances in 2012, 2013 and 2014; Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference tournament championships in 2012, 2013 and 2014; and conference regular-season titles in 2013 and 2014. In addition, the Engineers have won 20 games three straight times for the first time in school history (with six 20-win seasons total).

Recognized by his peers as one of the top coaches in the NCAA Midwest Region, Shaw has been named conference Coach of the Year five times during his Rose-Hulman tenure (1996, 1997, 2001, 2013 and 2014). In 2013, he was recognized by the National Association of Basketball Coaches as Midwest Region Coach of the Year and was also a finalist for the Glenn Robinson National Coach of the Year award.

Shaw's teams have qualified for the D-III National Tournament six times. His Engineers won the Indiana Collegiate Athletic Conference Tournament in 1996, giving Rose-Hulman its first NCAA berth in seven seasons. They earned subsequent NCAA berths in 1997 from the ICAC, in 1999 from the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference, and in 2012, 2013 and 2014 from the HCAC.

His 2013 team also led the nation in scoring defense, allowing fewer than 52 points per game.

Shaw began his college coaching career at Rose-Hulman under current DePauw coach Bill Fenlon. He spent five seasons working under both Fenlon and former Rose-Hulman coach Bill Perkins. The Engineers compiled a 72-55 record during that five-year span.

Shaw's coaching career has not been limited to the collegiate level. He served as an assistant coach under Pat Rady at Terre Haute South High School from 1986-88, where he coached former NFL tight end Tony McGee and former Indiana University and NBA player Brian Evans. During that two-year stint, the Braves went 40-9 with two sectionals and a regional title, and were ranked No. 1 in Indiana.

Shaw graduated from Terre Haute South in 1978, and he earned bachelor's degrees in journalism and political science from Indiana University in 1982. He added a master's degree in sports administration from Indiana State in 1989.

Greg Tonagel, Indiana Wesleyan

Greg Tonagel recently completed his ninth season at the helm of the Indiana Wesleyan University men's basketball team.

Since becoming the Wildcats' coach in April 2005, Tonagel has guided IWU to unprecedented success both on and off the court. With a 235-75 record, seven conference championships, four elite eight appearances and this past season, Tonagel reached uncharted territory by leading the Wildcats to their first NAIA Division II national championship. For his efforts, he was named the NABC/NAIA Division II National Coach of the Year.

Tonagel has been named the conference Coach of the Year five times. His teams have spent time in the top five of the national polls in each of the last eight years. Despite being a head coach for only nine seasons, Tonagel already is the winningest coach in IWU program history. He has the highest winning percentage, the most regular season victories, the most post-season victories, the most national tournament appearances and the most wins in the school history along with the only seven conference championships.

A former Valparaiso University point guard, known for his hard work and energy, Tonagel has brought those characteristics to the Wildcats' basketball program. Tonagel was introduced as the IWU men's basketball coach on April 1, 2005. Drawing from experience gained from leading the Valparaiso Crusaders to four NCAA tournament appearances as a starting point guard, along with the tutelage of mentor Homer Drew, Tonagel has helped orchestrate a new era of Wildcats' basketball.

Indiana Wesleyan has posted the seven best seasons in program history under Tonagel. The team set a school record with 31 wins in 2013-14. Previously, the Wildcats had set school records with 30 wins in 2006-07 and tied that mark with 30 wins in 2009-10.

Prior to Tonagel's hiring, the Wildcats had won seven games and finished



last in the Mid-Central Conference. The program improved by 10 wins under Tonagel's tutelage in his first year on the bench and reached the NAIA Elite Eight in his second season. Making a name for himself when it comes to program building, Tonagel has done it through sound developmental teaching and high-caliber recruiting.

Known for defense, the Wildcats led the nation in scoring defense at 59 points per game at the completion of the 2006-07 regular season. They also ranked in the top 10 in the nation in six defensive categories in 2009-10. Although it all starts on the defensive end for the Wildcats, an up-tempo, aggressive offensive style that utilizes skilled and creative play has rejuvenated Luckey Arena into a fantastic place to experience a basketball game. Tonagel and his staff have introduced an innovative offensive style that players want to be a part of and fans desire to see.

Perhaps the biggest influence that Tonagel and the staff have had on the program is the "I am Third" culture. Fostering a mentality that seeks to put God first, others second and oneself third has created a culture of success. Success that comes from enlarging those around you. It's a success that comes from serving a purpose greater than oneself.

Tonagel's teams have passion and toughness. They are known for the work ethic. Whether it is writing a paper, helping a neighbor or working out in the gym, Tonagel demands commitment and 100 percent effort from each student-athlete.

Many consider Tonagel's weight and conditioning programs to be as challenging as any around. Players learn to bond together, which is the only way to survive these grueling workouts.

Prior to his current position, Tonagel served as Director of Basketball Operations at Valparaiso University, where he played in four NCAA Tournaments. He also led his LaPorte High School team to the last single-class State Finals in 1997.

Tonagel and his wife, Amy, have three children – Jace, William, and Allie. The coach is active in a number of organizations and causes, most notably his church.

Jason Delaney, Indianapolis Tech

Jason Delaney recently completed his third season as boys' basketball coach at Indianapolis Tech, leading the Titans to the Class 4A state championship.

Delaney's teams have gone 64-12 during his tenure at Tech, including a 27-2 mark in 2013-14. In 10 seasons as a head coach, his career record is 145-90.

A 1995 graduate of Lafayette Central Catholic, Delaney competed in basketball for the Knights. He attended Ball State University, where he received a bachelor's degree in secondary education in 2001.

Delaney began his career as a head coach at Waldron in 2003-04, guiding the Mohawks to the Class A state championship with a 27-0 undefeated season.

He then moved to Southport for four seasons, to Anderson Highland for one season, to Indianapolis Washington for one season and then to Indianapolis Tech for the past three seasons.

His teams have won two sectionals (2004, 2014), two regionals (2004, 2014), two semistates (2004, 2014) and two state championships (2004, 2014).

Shane Adams, Shoot-A-Way Basketball

Shane Adams has been a Shoot-A-Way clinician since 2004, speaking at more than 50 clinics over the past 10 years. He will talk to the IBCA audience on "Game-Like Shooting Drills."

Adams has coached high school basketball for eight seasons, five years in Colorado and three years in Ohio. His teams have captured four conference championships, two regional titles, two Elite Eight crowns and one state championship.

In Ohio, Adams was boys' basketball coach at Upper Sandusky High School from 2010-13 with a record of 38-27.

In Colorado, Adams was a boys' basketball assistant at Sangre de Cristo High School for three seasons, helping the team to a 61-13 record over that span and a state championship in 2001. He became the Sangre de Cristo girls' head coach for two seasons, going 32-12 and leading the team to a regional crown.

He also has been a girls' basketball head coach at Del Norte (Colo.) High School and an assistant women's basketball coach at Adams State College in Colorado.

Adams also owned and operated the ABC Basketball Skills Academy from 2004-08. He specialized in shooting and skills instruction for junior high and high school athletes from all over the state of Colorado.

IBCA INITIATIVE AGAINST CANCER

Thanks to all coaches, teams, schools and dedicated community members who have participated in the sixth annual IBCA initiative against cancer.

INDIANA ALL-STARS

It's that time of year again. We are working on putting together the 2014 edition of the All-Star series with Kentucky. We are coming off our best crowd in the past six years.

I have been asked many times how the Indiana All-Star team is selected, and I would like to share with you some of the selection process.

In one respect, this is the easiest job in the state. At the same time, it may be the most difficult. Year in and year out, there is a seemingly endless supply of All-Star-caliber talent, but the challenging part is that we only have 13 uniforms.

Three things we try to keep in mind in the process -- we try to be informed, we try to be fair and we try to be qualified. There is no perfect process, and some subjectivity always is an unavoidable aspect of the selection process.

We try to see as many potential All-Stars as possible in person. Knowing that we cannot see all of them, we have a group of current and retired coaches from around Indiana who "scout" games throughout the state and provide input to us.

Another useful tool in the evaluation process is video. With the advent of firms such as Krossover and HUDL, we get to see several videos of potential All-Stars.

We also attend the IBCA's Top 100 Showcase each July and the Hoosier Basketball Magazine Top 60 Senior Workouts each March and April to see how the players perform and to see how they work together with their teammates.

Each year, the IBCA has two groups of 22 coaches from around the state (one group for boys, another group for girls) that select the All-State team. We attend their meetings and listen to what they have to say about the candidates.

We seek the input of our Junior All-Star Coaches. They had the opportunity to work with several potential All-Stars, and they fill out an extensive evaluation form on each player. However, this does not mean that Junior All-Stars from one year are the only candidates considered for the next year's (senior) All-Star team. In fact, of the last 10 (senior) All-Star teams selected, the All-Stars have had at least one player on each team who had not been chosen a Junior All-Star the previous year.

We must also look at the positions played by the candidates. It is pretty obvious that we cannot field a team of 12 point guards when we face the Kentucky All-Stars. We need guards, forwards and centers.

Finally, we sit down with the All-Star coaching staffs for that specific year to discuss personnel with them as we try to fill out a roster that will be competitive and represent Indiana well.

One other question that arises in some years is the use of a 14th uniform. That is for a player who clearly would have been an All-Star, but because of a severe injury, he or she cannot finish his or her careers. They DO NOT take anyone's uniform from the top 13 chosen, but they deservedly receive the lifetime honor of being selected an All-Star.

Perhaps Steve Witty describes the entire process best. The veteran coach calls this a selection process, not a rejection one. We try to reward those players who have had outstanding careers and at the same time select a team that can beat Kentucky.

2013-14 BOYS COACHES OF THE YEAR

Congratulations to the 2013-14 Bob King Award winners as Boys' Coaches of the Year.

Al Rhodes, Penn - District 1

Al Rhodes guided Penn to a 23-2 record this season that included championships in the Northern Indiana Conference and in Class 4A Sectional 3 at South Bend Washington.

Rhodes has guided the Kingsmen to an 83-51 record in six seasons at his alma mater, and the Hall of Fame coach has a 539-243 mark in 33 seasons.

A 1970 graduate of Penn, Rhodes attended Tri-State University (now Trine University) and earned bachelor's degrees in math and mechanical engineering. He played basketball at both schools, lettering three years in high school and four years in college. He also acquired a master's degree in education from Indiana University in 1982.

Rhodes began his high school coaching career as a boys' basketball assistant at Angola. After one year with the Hornets, he moved to Warsaw and served four seasons as an assistant. He then became the Tigers' varsity coach, compiling a 405-133 record over 22 seasons highlighted by the 1984 state championship. His tenure in Warsaw also included 10 Northern Lakes Conference championships, 12 holiday tournament trophies, 14 sectional, seven regional and four semistate crowns. Warsaw also won the 1995 Hall of Fame Classic.

After one year away from coaching, Rhodes took over at Logansport, compiling a 39-47 record in four seasons with the Berries. He then moved to Fort Wayne Northrop, posting a 10-12 mark in one season, before being hired in July 2008 to return to his alma mater. At Penn, his Kingsmen have been 2010 NIC Tournament champions, 2013 NIC co-champions and 2014 NIC champions.

Over the years, Rhodes has guided six Indiana All-Star players, including Mr. Basketball winners in Jeff Grose in 1985 and Kevin Ault in 1996. He also mentored three All-Americans, including future NBA player Rick Fox.

Rhodes also has received many honors, including being named NLC Coach of the Year seven times, was chosen the Fort Wayne Journal-Gazette's Coach of the Year in 1981, was picked as the South Bend Tribune's Coach of the Year in 1985 and 1992, was chosen the Fort Wayne News-Sentinel's Coach of the Year in 1985, being selected Loganland Coach of the Year in 2006 and being voted NIC Coach of the Year this season. He also was selected IBCA District 2 Coach of the Year in 1984, 1986 and 1992.

Rhodes was Indiana All-Star head coach in 1995 and an All-Star assistant coach in 1985. He also coached national all-star teams in the 1988 Capital Classic and in the 2005 McDonald's All-American Game. Also, he coached in the 1992 Nancy Rehm All-Star Game, the 1992 Hoosier Basketball Magazine East-West All-Star Game, the 1992 South Bend Tribune SunBurst Classic and the 2007 Indiana North-South All-Star Classic.

He has spread the word about basketball overseas, mentoring players in Australia, Turkey and The Bahamas. In 2003, he served as an assistant coach for the Bahamian National Team.

Rhodes, 61, who was inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 2010, works as a math teacher at Penn High School.

Aaron Wolfe, NorthWood - District 1

Aaron Wolfe guided NorthWood to a 21-3 record this season, including the championship of Class 3A Sectional 21 at Wawasee.

The 40-year-old coach has compiled a 98-62 mark in seven seasons with the Panthers, his first assignment as a varsity basketball coach.

A 1992 graduate of Monmouth High School in Monmouth, Ill., Wolfe – who attended elementary school in Benton County, Ind. – competed in basketball, baseball, golf and cross country while a student. He matriculated to Manchester College, helping the Spartans' basketball team to an NCAA Division III national runner-up finish as a junior in 1995 with a 31-1 record. He also played baseball at Manchester.

Wolfe began his coaching career in 1998-99 as a boys' basketball assistant at Westfield. He moved to Warsaw as an assistant coach for eight years before being hired to take over the NorthWood program in the fall of 2007.

With the Panthers, Wolfe's teams have posted winning ledgers in six of seven seasons with sectional championships in 2012 and 2014. They also captured the Winning Edge Holiday Tournament title in 2011 and 2014.

Wolfe teaches biology, chemistry and environmental science at NorthWood.

Kent Chezem, Covington - District 2

Kent Chezem recently completed his 10th season as boys' basketball coach at Covington High School, where his team went 18-2 and claimed the championship of the Wabash River Conference.

A 1987 graduate of Clinton Prairie High School, Chezem was a three-year starter for the Gophers and set the school's all-time assist record with 342. He then attended Olivet Nazarene University, where



he was a four-year starter at point guard and set the ONU career record with 687 assists.

Chezem began his coaching career as a boys' basketball assistant coach at Fountain Central for two seasons. He then became boys' basketball head coach at Clinton Prairie, compiling a 112-106 record in 10 seasons, before moving to Covington.

With the Trojans, Chezem's teams have gone 130-92 while winning five conference championships and sectional titles in 2005, 2007 and 2010. Chezem was honored as Lafayette Journal and Courier Coach of the Year in 2000.

Chezem, 45, teaches government, economics and world geography at Covington. He and his wife, Dara, have two children – a daughter, Avery (17), and a son, Cade (14).

Brent Keck, Perry Meridian - District 2

Brent Keck has just finished his fourth season as the boys' basketball coach at Perry Meridian and his 17th season overall as a boys' varsity coach. Over the last two seasons, Keck guided Perry Meridian to back-to-back winning seasons for the first time in 12 years with 11-9 and 13-7 marks.

Keck is a 1987 Anderson Highland graduate and a 1991 UNC-Asheville graduate, where he played four years of Division I basketball.

Keck began his coaching career as an assistant at Anderson Highland. He also has served as an assistant at Shenandoah, East Noble and Frankton, serving and learning from coaches such as Alan Darner, Brent Tinder, Marty Johnson and Rex Bauchert.

Prior to taking over at Perry Meridian in the fall of 2010, Keck was the head coach for two seasons at Cowan (18-23), four seasons at South Adams (37-49), five seasons at Frankton (76-37) and two seasons at Scottsburg (22-20). He has compiled a career record of 186-178 with three conference championships. Keck also was the Frankton girls' basketball coach for one season.

Keck resides in Indianapolis, teaches at Perry Meridian in the business education department and works with credit recovery.

Bryan Hughes, Barr-Reeve - District 3

Bryan Hughes of Barr-Reeve has had extensive success and is a District 3 Coach of the Year. He guided his 2013-14 team to a 26-2 record and has a 384-142 mark in 22 seasons with the Vikings.

Overall, Hughes has a 497-190 record in 29 seasons, including 12 conference, 13 sectional, four regional and four semistate crowns.

Previously he coached three seasons at North Vermillion and four at Fountain Central, compiling 39-28 and 74-21 records at those schools. He twice previously has been named an IBCA District 3 Coach of the Year – at Fountain Central in 1991 and at Barr-Reeve in 2012. He also served as an Indiana All-Star assistant coach in 2003.

Hughes is a 1978 graduate of Covington High School and a 1982 graduate of the University of Indianapolis. He has bachelor's degrees from Ulndy and Indiana State as well as a master's degree in business education from Indiana State.

He played basketball, football, baseball and tennis in high school and was a three-year basketball letterman and two-year captain at Indianapolis.

Jamie Kolkmeier, Corydon Central - District 3

Jamie Kolkmeier guided Corydon Central to a 19-4 record in 2013-14 that included a co-championship of the Mid-Southern Conference and the championship of the PSC Holiday Classic.

In eight seasons with the Panthers, Kolkmeier's teams have gone 118-70 with two sectional titles and a share of two MSC crowns.

A 1992 graduate of Waldron High School, Kolkmeier attended Franklin College where he was a three-year member of the Grizzlies basketball program.

He began his coaching career in 1995-96 as a boys' basketball assistant at Waldron, then moved to Kokomo to work for Basil Mawbey and Charlie Hall from 1996-2000.

In 2000, Kolkmeier became the varsity basketball coach at North Judson, coaching the Blue Jays for six seasons and compiling a 59-70 slate. He then moved to Corydon Central, where his Panthers have posted winning records in six of eight seasons. Highlights of his tenure at Corydon include sectional crowns in 2010 and 2011 as well as co-conference titles in 2011 and 2014.

Kolkmeier, whose overall record is 177-140 in 14 seasons, teaches algebra at Corydon Central. He has been named head coach of the 2014 Junior All-Star coaches. He also was MSC co-coach of the Year in 2014.

Kolkmeier and his wife, Jackie, have two daughters – Julianne and Josie.



2013-14 GIRLS COACHES OF THE YEAR

Congratulations to the 2013-14 Bob King Award winners as Girls' Coaches of the Year.

Skeeter Heath, LaPorte - District 1

Skeeter Heath recently completed his 11th season as girls' basketball coach at LaPorte, leading the Slicers to a 20-3 season and the Duneland Conference championship.

Heath's teams amassed a 96-142 record during his time at LaPorte, where he rebuilt a program that struggled in the middle of his tenure but recovered to post winning seasons the past three years.

Previously, Heath was a boys' basketball head coach at Muncie Burriss, a boys' basketball head coach at Wheeler, a boys' basketball assistant at Merrillville and a boys' basketball head coach at Logansport. His teams went 49-36 at Burriss, 87-105 at Wheeler and 22-41 at Logansport.

Heath, 59, who competed in basketball, baseball and cross country as a student at Cowan High School, is a Ball State graduate who teaches in the business and technology department at LaPorte.

He and his wife, Bev, have one daughter, Jaclyn, a current senior at LaPorte.

Following the season, Heath announced his resignation as the Slicers' coach so he can be free to travel and follow his daughter's basketball career at North Alabama.

Kristi Kaniewski Ulrich, Penn - District 1

Kristi Kaniewski Ulrich guided Penn girls' basketball to a 25-2 record this season highlighted by a Class 4A state runner-up finish. She has compiled a 108-14 record in five seasons, with state runner-up finishes in 2011 and 2014.

A 1999 graduate of Mishawaka, Ulrich played basketball at Bethel College in Mishawaka and helped the Pilots to Christian College national championships in 2000 and 2003.

Ulrich served as a girls' basketball assistant coach for four seasons at Mishawaka and two years at Penn before being named the Penn head coach in the spring of 2009. Since then, her Kingsmen have gone 16-3, 23-2, 19-5 and 25-2 during her tenure. Her teams have won four sectionals, three regionals and two semistates.

Ulrich has been selected head coach for the Junior All-Stars for 2014. Previously, she was named NIC Coach of the Year in 2010, 2011 and 2013. Ulrich also was a coach in the 2010 NIC vs. NLC Champions of Character All-Star Game.

Ulrich and her husband, Jimmie, have a daughter – Avery (1).

Chris Giffin, Lawrence North - District 2

Chris Giffin has been girls' basketball coach for two seasons at Lawrence North, compiling a 46-6 record with two Marion County Tournament championships, two Metropolitan Interscholastic Conference titles and one sectional and one regional crown.

A 1996 graduate of Ben Davis, Giffin competed in basketball, baseball and tennis for the Giants, earning all-state honors in tennis as a senior.

Giffin matriculated to Indiana University, where he was a student manager for Bob Knight from 1998-2000. He was a boys' basketball assistant at Lawrence North while student teaching in 2000-01, then was a men's graduate assistant at Texas Tech from 2001-2004.

He returned to Lawrence North and served as a boys' basketball assistant from the fall of 2004 through the 2011-12 season, filling roles as head freshman coach, head JV coach and varsity assistant during that span.

Giffin took over the LN girls' program in the fall of 2012 and has guided the Wildcats to records of 21-4 and 25-2 in two seasons. He twice has been selected MIC Coach of the Year and Marion County Coach of the Year.

The 35-year-old coach and his wife, Jenica, have a daughter, Bailee (3).

Rich Schelsky, Western Boone - District 2

Rich Schelsky has compiled a 66-22 record in four seasons as girls' basketball coach at Western Boone, including an 18-6 mark in 2013-14 that was highlighted by an appearance in a Class 3A regional final.

A 1993 graduate of Rockville High School, the 39-year-old coach played basketball and baseball for the Rox. He scored 1,272 points in his basketball career for Rockville and later attended Indiana State.

Schelsky began his coaching career at Rockville, serving as a boys' basketball assistant for five seasons (1997-2002) and the boys' basketball head coach for one season. His Rox went 10-13 in 2002-03.

He then was a boys' basketball assistant for two seasons at Northview (2003-05) and for one year at Western Boone (2009-10) before being named



the WeBo girls' basketball coach in the fall of 2010. His Lady Stars posted records of 15-6, 19-3 and 14-7 prior to this season's 18-6.

Schelsky also was varsity baseball coach at Rockville for nine seasons (1997 through 2005), winning regional titles in 1998 and 1999. He also was baseball coach at Western Boone for three seasons (2009 through 2011).

Schelsky currently works as the junior high athletic director at Western Boone.

He and his wife, DeLisa, have three children – Treigh (7), Birkley (5) and Kelby (1).

Steve Goans, Evansville Mater Dei - District 3

Steve Goans guided Evansville Mater Dei to a 26-2 record in 2013-14 that included a Class 3A state runner-up finish. That came after he directed the Wildcats back-to-back Class 2A state championships in 2012 and 2013.

Goans has posted a 135-39 record the past seven seasons at Mater Dei and has a 207-122 mark in two stints with the Wildcats over 16 seasons (he coached the team from 1980-89 and from 2007-present).

Goans is a 1976 graduate of Mater Dei, and he played basketball and baseball for the Wildcats. As a coach, his teams have won sectionals in 1986, 2010, 2012, 2013 and 2014. They also have captured regionals and semistates in 2012, 2013 and 2014.

Goans was selected Evansville-area Coach of the Year in 2012, 2013 and 2014. He also was chosen ICGSA Class 2A state Coach of the Year in 2012.

After high school, Goans attended the University of Southern Indiana (then Indiana State-Evansville) and played baseball for one season.

Goans works in receiving for Novitex Enterprise Solutions, a Connecticut-based firm with an office in Evansville.

Goans and his wife, Becky, have two adult children – Matt and Leslie – and recently welcomed their first grandchild, Cora.

Gretchen Miles, Washington - District 3

Gretchen Miles has compiled a 76-49 record in six seasons at Washington, her alma mater. That includes a 17-4 mark in 2013-14, her fifth winning season of her tenure.

Miles was a standout player for the Hatchets, graduating in 1997 with 1,588 career points. She later played two seasons at the University of Southern Indiana and graduated from USI with a degree in elementary education. She also played tennis for the Screaming Eagles.

Miles began her coaching career as a junior high school coach in Washington for two years. She then became a high school assistant coach for four years before becoming the Hatchets' head coach.

Miles, a teacher at Lena Dunn Elementary School for 12 years, also coaches girls' soccer for the Hatchets. She was a soccer assistant for two seasons and has been the school's varsity soccer coach for six years.

Miles has been named an Indiana All-Star assistant coach for 2014.

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CONGRATULATIONS TO THE ROY GARDNER AWARD WINNER: TERRY MAGNUSON

Terry Magnuson has officiated IHSAA athletics for 37 years, including three boys' basketball State Finals and four girls' basketball State Finals.

A 1974 graduate of LaVille High School, Magnuson earned 10 letters in three sports for the Lancers – two in basketball, four in baseball and four in tennis. He is a member of LaVille's all-time athletic group.

Magnuson attended Butler on an athletic scholarship, playing four seasons of baseball for the Bulldogs and earning a bachelor's degree in education in 1978. He later earned a master's degree from IUPUI in 1981 and an Educational Specialist degree from Indiana University in 1989.

Magnuson began officiating basketball in 1977 and remains active in the sport. He also was a baseball umpire for 14 years, 1992-2005.

In boys' basketball, he has worked 31 sectionals, 23 regionals, 10 semistates and State Finals in 2004 (3A), 2007 (4A) and 2011 (1A). He also has called the title games in the boys' Hall of Fame Classic in 1993, 2004 and 2011. In girls' basketball, he has called 23 sectionals, 17 regionals, eight semistate and State Finals in 1991, 1993, 1996 and 2012 (3A). He also worked the girls' Hall of Fame Classic in 1991 and girls' Indiana-Kentucky All-Star Game in 2004.

Magnuson also has called women's college basketball games at the NCAA Division I, Division II, Division III and NAIA levels for 23 seasons. Highlights include working three NCAA Division II regionals, one NCAA Division III regional, three Great Lakes Valley Conference Tournament championship games, the Mid-Central Conference Tournament five times, the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference Tournament three times and the North Coast Athletic Conference Tournament two times.

In baseball, Magnuson called 13 sectionals, eight regionals, two semistates and the 2000 IHSAA State Finals (3A).

Magnuson has been active within the Indiana Officials Association. He served as the group's president in 1997-98, its recording secretary/treasurer from 1998-2001 and has been its webmaster from 2001-present. He also was a speaker at the National Association of Sport Officials National Convention in 1998. He currently is an Associate Director for the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame and sits on some of its committees.

Magnuson has received numerous awards as a basketball official. Those include the Outstanding Girls' Basketball official from the IHSAA in 1997, the Outstanding Girls' Basketball official from the Indiana Officials Association in 1997 and 2011, the Outstanding Boys' Basketball official from the IOA in 2010 and the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame "Center Circle Award" in 2011.

Magnuson, 58, currently works as the principal of Pleasant Crossing Elementary School in Whiteland. He began his career in education as a math teacher at Clay Junior High in Carmel from 1978-91. While in Carmel, he coached cross-country, football and tennis at the junior high level and was the high school varsity assistant in baseball.

He was an assistant principal at Center Grove Middle School from 1991-99. He became a principal at Clark-Pleasant Middle School in Whiteland from 1999-2001. He second principal's job was at Break-O-Day Elementary in New Whiteland from 2001-07 and has served at Pleasant Crossing Elementary from 2007 to the present.

As a principal, Magnuson received the Cummins Partners in Progress Award in 2002, the Above & Beyond Award from Clark-Pleasant Community Schools in 2007 and was chosen the 2012 District 9 Elementary Principal of the Year by the Indiana Association of School Principals. He currently serves on the IASP Board of Directors for District 9 and is a past president, past vice president and current treasurer for the District 9 group.

He also is a member and ruling elder of the 2nd Reformed Presbyterian Church in Indianapolis.

Magnuson and his wife, Debbie, have four adult children – Greg, Beth, Brad and Nathan – and one grandchild.



CONGRATULATIONS TO THE MILDRED BALL AWARD WINNER: PHIL VIDITO

Phil Vidito has spent much of his adult life as a contest official in multiple sports, most notably 39 seasons as a high school basketball official.

Vidito got his start in officiating in 1975, and he has officiated basketball, football, softball and volleyball over the years.

Over the years, Vidito has worked 26 sectionals, 17 regionals, seven semistates and four State Finals (1995, 1998, 2001 and 2006) in girls' basketball. He also has called 28 sectionals, 17 regionals, six semistates and two State Finals (2000 and 2005) in boys' basketball. In addition, he called games in the boys' Hall of Fame Classic in 1989 and the girls' Hall of Fame Classic in 1992.

IBCA PROPOSALS TO THE IHSAA

This is the year the IBCA was able to make proposals to the IHSAA concerning our sport.

After surveying all head coaches, with strong support from head coaches, the IBCA decided to make two proposals:

1. An idea to change the state tournament format.
2. To change to length of quarters for JV games from six minutes to seven minutes.

Both proposals were presented to the Indiana Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association on March 23 and to the IHSAA Executive Committee on March 28.

Both the IIAAA and the IHSAA received both proposals with positive feedback.

The IHSAA now is studying the proposals and will take action on them at its board meeting on May 5.



2014 VIRGIL SWEET DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARDS

Each year the IBCA Board of Directors selects individuals from each of the three IBCA Districts to receive the Virgil Sweet Distinguished Service Award. The award, named in honor of the longtime former Executive Director of the IBCA, is given to individuals who have provided meritorious service in the promotion of basketball in the state of Indiana.

Chuck Freeby - District 1

WHME sports director Chuck Freeby knows the complete Michiana sports scene as well as anyone, mainly because he has been a part of it all his life. Born in South Bend, he is a 1982 graduate of Elkhart Central High School. In 1986, he received a B.A. in American Studies from the University of Notre Dame.

These days, he is well known for his love of area high school sports. That passion showed for 17 years at WNDU-TV, where Freeby pioneered "Friday Night Flights" during football season and "Roundball Roundup" for basketball. Now Freeby is at WHME-TV 46, where he calls play-by-play on the high school football and basketball "Game of the Week," various college sports events, including Notre Dame baseball, and provides morning sports reports on Pulse FM.

Freeby is also a co-host of LeSea's "Harvest" show, reporting international news every weekday.

An award-winning journalist, Freeby has received honors for his reporting of a variety of sports events, including his radio play-by-play calls of Notre Dame hockey. He also has done play-by-play and color commentary for SportsChannel Chicago.

For the last few years, Freeby has been doing double-duty, working his full-time job at LeSea and filling in part-time at WNDU.

Freeby also takes on the challenge of giving back to the community in the form of public service. He is a frequent guest speaker and auctioneer around town for a variety of charities. He served for many years as a board member for the Women's Care Center and co-chair of the annual House Raffle, which benefits both Women's Care Center and the Healthy Family Center of Mishawaka. His work over the last 19 years has raised millions of dollars for the Michiana community. He has also served as a coach and umpire at Chet Waggoner Little League and in the Inter-City Catholic League.

Freeby and his wife, Diane, have six children – Peter, Christopher, Mary, Jeanie, Rosie and T.J.

Steve Hanlon - District 1

Steve Hanlon is a 1981 graduate of Crown Point High School and a 1991 graduate of Evangel University in Springfield, Mo.

Hanlon began his professional writing career at The Times of Northwest Indiana in 1991, working there for nine years before moving to The Indianapolis Star in 2000. He worked in Indianapolis for four years before returning to The Times in 2004 because he missed his family and the outstanding pizza.

Hanlon is a Chicago Cubs' fan, which makes him quite happy on certain days. Same goes for the Chicago Bears. Since Larry Bird retired, his interest in the NBA has dropped. Hanlon loves covering the "black-and-blue" style of the high school game in his corner of the state.

Hanlon and his wife, Karen, have two daughters – Marley and Gracie.

Bob Nagle - District 1

Bob Nagle is in his 38th year of broadcasting in the South Bend area. Bob grew up in Mishawaka and attended Marian High School during some of its greatest years. From 1968 through 1971, Bob Otolski's football Knights were 34-5-1, including back-to-back undefeated seasons in 1969 and 1970.

That lit a spark in Nagle, who played only one season but stayed on as a team manager, student trainer and team videographer. The technology was new in 1971 and while videoing games, Nagle added commentary to the action. Coach Otolski discovered that when a letter from a recruiter asked him to "send us your announcer"; Coach Otolski passed that to Nagle with the suggestion that he pursue that in the future.

That began the next fall at IU-South Bend. During his team at IUSB, Nagle was taught by veteran broadcaster Roland Kelly, who later served as Nagle's sports director at WSBT. Nagle's professional career began at WSBT during the 1977-78 school year with broadcasts of high school football, high school basketball and Notre Dame basketball with Lynn Thornton and Jerry Bleck. Notre Dame won the national championship in football and Irish basketball went to the Final Four in St. Louis – it was quite a start.

During the next 10 years, Nagle covered multiple state championship

games, including Plymouth's 1982 basketball title with Scott Skiles, Penn's first football title in 1983, a Warsaw basketball crown with Jeff Grose in 1984. During his career, Nagle has been fortunate to cover many local teams at state, including St. Joseph and Penn in 1995 and Jimtown's four titles and six trips to Indianapolis. Concord, NorthWood and Plymouth have added to the great memories as well as the capable coaches and outstanding players.

Nagle has been a part of broadcast teams at WSBT, WWJY, WNSN, WGTC, WHME, WHPZ, WHPD and has been part of the IHSAA's statewide network. His coverage of Notre Dame football has included the annual spring game as well as freelance postgame coverage for networks around the country. Nagle currently is sports marketing director at LeSea Broadcasting and WHME TV. He serves as voice of Notre Dame women's basketball and works with Notre Dame baseball.

Nagle and his wife, Mary Carol, have been married for 33 years and have three children – Bob (30), Joe (28) and Mary Catherine (20).

Danny Danielson - District 2

Danny Danielson is 94 years young and still actively involved in many organizations while following basketball and other sports at all levels.

Vice Chairman of the City Securities Corporation, Indiana's oldest and largest investment Banking firm, Danielson continues to serve as a Director of the Indiana University Foundation, a Director of Indiana State Chamber of Commerce, a Director of Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame, a Director of Wittenbraker YMCA of New Castle and a Director of Americana Bancorp. He also is a member of the Board of Governors for the Riley Children's Foundation, on the Board of Advisors for Indiana University-East and Chairman of Walther Cancer Foundation.

Danielson is a 1937 graduate of Pierre High School in Pierre, S.D. He also graduated from Indiana University in 1942, where he was a three-year letterman in baseball, with a bachelor's in education. He then served in the U.S. Navy for four years, earning the rank of Lieutenant Senior Grade. Danielson worked two years at IU as a physical education instructor, in the alumni office and as IU's interim baseball coach for the 1948 season.

Danielson began his business career in 1948 with ModernFold, a starting as a salesman for the New Castle-based firm and working his way up to company president in 1969. He left ModernFold in 1976 to join City Securities Corporation in 1976 as a senior vice president and was promoted to vice chairman in 1981.

Over the years Danielson has received numerous accolades, including the Chamber of Commerce "Citizen of the Year" in 1972 and 1983, the IU Distinguished Alumni Service Award, the Zora G. Clevenger Award in recognition of outstanding contributions to IU Athletics, the IU President's Medal of Excellence, an Indiana Jefferson Award for distinguished public service, the Thomas Hart Benton Medallion from Indiana University and the naming of IU-East's Henry County facility in his honor.

Danielson is a member of The Honorable Order of Kentucky Colonels, has been named a Sagamore of the Wabash three times, was the Rotarian of the Year in 2007 and received the Governor's Schemm Award in 2009. He is a member of the Pierre High School Athletic Hall of Fame and received an honorary law degree from IU in 1994.

Danielson and his wife, Patricia, reside in New Castle and have three adult daughters – Mary, Susan and Amy.

Charlie Hughes - District 2

Charlie Hughes has devoted much of his life as a volunteer organizer of basketball events for the youth of Indiana.

A 1958 graduate of Marion High School, Hughes began coaching men's basketball teams in Amateur Athletic Union programs in 1961. His team, the Anderson ALACs, won local, state level and Midwest Region events and participated in the National Finals. In 1974, Hughes succeeded Bill Summers as basketball chairman of the Indiana AAU district and now is in his 41st year in that position. In the late 1970s and 1980s, he also served as the Indiana AAU girls' basketball chairman before the program became so large that a separate girls' chairman took over and Hughes focused his attention on the booming boys' program. Hughes also served as AAU boys' basketball Midwest chairman from 1975-81.

In addition, Hughes organized the Madison County Sertoma All-Star Basketball game from 1974 through 1994, proceeds benefiting Special Olympics programming. He also coordinated an annual series with an Indiana boys' squad that faced a Russian Junior team from 1976 through 1981.

More recently, Hughes was instrumental in the founding and operations of an Indiana-based youth sports program called USSFA. This group has served school-aged athletes across Indiana for nearly two decades, organizes the Indy

High School Shootout each summer (which has grown into the largest boys' basketball summer event in Indiana) and has awarded more than \$10,000 in college scholarships to its members.

Over the years, Hughes also served Indiana AAU as the state registration chairman, second vice president and first vice president.

Providing his efforts without pay throughout, Hughes has been recognized with numerous awards over the years. Among them are the Joe Boland Award from the Indiana Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association for service to youth in 1989 and again in 1996; the Dr. James Macholtz Award from Indiana Special Olympics in 1987; Special Contribution Award from Indiana AAU in 1983; the Outstanding Volunteer Leadership Award from Indiana AAU in 1990; Vision Award from AAU National boys' basketball in 1991; and being recognized as Sertoman of the Year from the Anderson Sertoma Club in 1989 and 1990.

Hughes worked for Hoosier Market in Marion and Anderson as a student and for several years following high school. In 1964, he moved to a position with General Motors in Anderson and remained there until retiring in 2006.

Now 74 years young, Hughes and his wife, Catherine, enjoy spending time with their adult children – Debbie, Sherry, Jill, April, Rodney, Greg and Marcus – as well as five grandchildren.

Andy Graham - District 3

Andy Graham, a decidedly mediocre basketball player on a Westfield Shamrocks team that won 18 games in 1973 (no thanks to him), is a 1978 Indiana University graduate who joined the Bloomington Herald-Telephone (now Herald-Times) staff in 1982. He has quite contentedly worked there ever since, covering both sports and news.

Graham has won many awards over that span, such as the 1997 Corky Lamm Indiana Sportswriter of the Year honor and, more recently, was named the state's top sports columnist in 2012 by the Hoosier State Press Association and the nation's top sports columnist for the H-T's circulation class in 2013 by the Associated Press Sports Editors.

Graham was a 2013 inductee to the Indiana Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association Hall of Fame.

He worked alongside Bob Hammel at the H-T, covering virtually every IU football and basketball game for 15 years, before becoming the primary beat writer for IU football. He also covered IU soccer for 19 years, including Coach Jerry Yeagley's first five NCAA championship clubs. He covered the 1987 and 1992 NCAA men's basketball Final Fours and the 2000 NBA Finals.

Graham has served as the primary writer for Indiana high school basketball throughout his H-T sports tenure. He relished perusing papers from around the state to write a weekly statewide-oriented high school basketball column for many years and annually selected the H-T's Top 15 All-State Basketball Team, picked with solicited input from the state's coaches and therefore one of the most respected lists pertaining to Indiana players.

The Top 15 edition was discontinued following Graham's adjournment in 2001 to the H-T's news side to cover education and the arts – and, most especially, to keep more regular family hours while his sons were growing up. He returned to sports writing in 2010 and counts among his current duties serving as columnist for IU football and as the lead beat writer for Indiana high school boys' basketball and high school baseball. He writes a high school basketball notebook every Monday during the season, writes features and columns, and generally orchestrates coverage of the nine high school teams in the H-T region. He also selects an H-T All-Area Boys' Basketball Team every spring.

A devotee of all things Hoosier Hysteria, Graham made formal presentation of a state basketball tournament format proposal called "The Big Dance Compromise" to both IHSAA Commissioner Bobby Cox, in the fall of 2012, and a distinguished IBCA panel in the spring of 2013.

Graham lives in Bloomington with his wonderful wife, Susie, and their splendid sons, Alex and Evan (when they're home from college), and cats Calvin and Hobbes. He gets to spend lots of time in Indiana's venerable gymnasiums, which only adds to his happiness and gratification. Graham was and is a very fortunate man.

(But he still devoutly wishes the Shamrocks could have knocked off Carmel in that 1973 double-overtime sectional title game, which would have earned them a trip to the ever-wondrous Wigwam.)



Johnny McCrory - District 3

Johnny McCrory arrived at, what was then, WOOO in Shelbyville in 1998.

Now in his 16th season calling play-by-play for high school teams in Shelby County and 21st season overall McCrory has been with the Shelbyville radio station through two call-letter changes. The most recent, in 2007, signaled the beginning of his co-ownership of the station. WSVX AM-1520 now includes an FM station at 96.5 known as Giant 96. McCrory serves as the station's news and sports director and morning show host. In addition, McCrory hosts a sports talk show called Giant 96 Real Sports.

McCrory's professional career began as a news and sports director in 1993 at WHPO in Hoopston, IL, followed by a four year stop in the same role at WACF / WPRS in Paris, IL.

McCrory received the Marv Bates Indiana Sportscaster of the Year from the Indiana Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association in 2012.

While basketball and football top the list of high school sports coverage, over the years McCrory also handled play-by-play for baseball, softball, volleyball and cross country. He also has called basketball at the collegiate level for Eastern Illinois University.

A graduate of Hutsonville High School in Hutsonville, Ill., McCrory received a Bachelor's degree in Radio/TV from Southern Illinois University-Carbondale in 1993. While receiving his education, McCrory also broadcast news and play-by-play sports for WIDB, on the SIU-C campus, and at WKZI, Casey, Ill., while covering sports as a writer for the Robinson (Ill.) Daily News.

McCrory has three children – Ethan, Kylie and Jady – and lives in Shelbyville.

2013-14 ADMINISTRATORS OF THE YEAR

Congratulations to these Administrators of the Year:

Robert Falls - Athletic Director

Michigan City - District 1

Robert "Bear" Falls has impacted the lives of countless students and student athletes in Northwest Indiana, as an educator, coach and athletic director.

He began his career as a teacher of Physical Education, Health, and Driver's Education at Elston High School in Michigan City. During his 20 years at Elston, he was an assistant coach at the freshman, JV and Varsity levels for both football and basketball.

Falls was named Head Basketball Coach for Michigan City High School in 1995, a post he held until 2001. Under his leadership, the Wolves went 80-40 and never had a losing season. He guided City to a Duneland Conference championship in 1997-98 and three second-place finishes.

This June, Falls will retire as Athletic Director for the Michigan City Area Schools, a post he held since 2005.

Over his 40-year career, he has been active in Indiana athletics, most recently serving on the Indiana High School Athletic Association Board of Directors and Executive Committee (2007-2009). A strong supporter of youth sports, he has coached and officiated community leagues and tournaments for both softball and basketball.

Falls holds a bachelor's degree in Education from Illinois State University and a Master's in Education from Indiana University-Northwest.

As a high school athlete at Elston, he was named to the all-state football team. At Illinois State, he was the first player in school history to play both offensive and defensive halfback, breaking school records in pass receiving.

Chad Bolser - Athletic Director

Richmond - District 2

Chad Bolser is in his sixth year as Athletic Director at Richmond High School after 10 seasons as boys' basketball coach for the Red Devils.

Phil Ford - Principal

Jay County - District 2

2014 COACHES' ROUNDTABLE PARTICIPANTS

A roundtable of former coaches is one of the items planned for the 2014 IBCA Spring Clinic. This year's panel features a trio of coaches – Sam Alford, Jim Irwin and Donna Sullivan – who will offer their expertise on building programs that stand the test of time. Here is more info on each of the panelists.

Sam Alford

Sam Alford amassed more than 450 wins as a high school basketball coach in Indiana and coached nine additional years as a college assistant.

Alford earned much attention as the coach at New Castle, where his teams posted a 300-188 record over 20 seasons. He was an assistant coach for two years at Franklin and also was a head coach at Monroe City, South Knox and Martinsville – finishing with a career record of 452-245 in 29 seasons at Indiana high schools. As a high school coach, his teams won 17 sectionals, six regionals and one semistate.

He then moved to the college ranks, assisting his son Steve at Southwest Missouri State for four years and the University of Iowa for five years. As a college coach, he was a part of three teams that earned berths in the NCAA Tournament.

Alford coached sons Steve and Sean at New Castle, and more than 50 of Alford's prep players went on to play college basketball.

Alford three times was chosen an IBCA District Coach of the Year – District 3 in 1975 at Martinsville and District 4 in 1979 and 1995 at New Castle. He also was North Central Conference Coach of the Year three times, a former IBCA president and was Indiana's nominee for national coach of the year in 1984 and 1986. Alford was chosen as the Indiana All-Star head coach in 1985 after serving as an All-Star assistant coach in 1984. He also was chairman of the NABC's High School Rules Committee for 14 years.

One of his top memories as a high school coach was a weekend in 1983 when New Castle hosted Marion (with James Blackmon) on Friday night, then hosted Cathedral (with Scott Hicks and Shelton Smith) the next day. He recalls more than 18,000 fans attending the two games – both sellouts in the 9,325-seat New Castle Fieldhouse.

Another top memory was the opportunity to speak at the NABC Conference in 1979 held in conjunction with the NCAA Final Four. That was the year where Indiana State and Larry Bird played Michigan State and Magic Johnson in the NCAA championship game. Over the years, Alford noted that he has delivered talks on basketball in 28 states and in Europe.

Alford was a standout athlete at Washington High School where he graduated in 1956 and earned 14 varsity letters. He carried on the tradition at Franklin College, where he earned another 10 letters in basketball, baseball, cross country and tennis. Alford averaged 21 points as a senior in 1960, leading the nation in free throw shooting and earning Little All-American Honors.

Alford was chosen to the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame Silver Anniversary Team in 1985. He was inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 2002. He also has been inducted into the Franklin College Hall of Fame.

These days, Alford, 71, is a vice president of the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame and is a director of the Steve Alford Basketball Camp, a position he has held for 28 years.

Alford and his wife, Sharan, live in Brown County. They enjoy keeping up with their sons, daughters-in-law and seven grandchildren, who range in age from 21 to 12, as well as following UCLA and high school basketball. Alford also spends time fishing, golfing, following the St. Louis Cardinals and working with Franklin College and the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame.

Jim Irwin

Jim Irwin coached Indiana high school basketball for 37 years, including 18 years as a head coach at four schools. He was inducted into the Kosciusko County Basketball Hall of Fame in 2013.

A 1960 graduate of Atwood High School in northern Indiana, Irwin led the Greyhounds in scoring as a senior with 320 points. He played two years of basketball at Emporia University in Kansas before transferring to Ball State and playing two years of baseball for the Cardinals.

Irwin began his coaching career in 1964 as a boys' basketball assistant coach at Straughn for two years, then worked five years as an assistant at Pierceton. He followed by assisting for four seasons at Whitko, then landed his first head coaching position in 1975 at Bluffton.

Irwin guided the Tigers for five seasons, his teams winning sectional crowns in 1976 and 1977. He then moved to Southern Wells for five years, capturing another sectional title in 1982. He followed with a two-year head coaching stint at Salem.



Irwin then assisted for five seasons at Eastbrook before becoming the Panthers' head coach from 1995-2001 – collecting a final sectional championship in 1998.

Irwin, who earned bachelor's degrees in history and physical education, was the BSU Alumni Coach of the Year in 1982. Over the years, he noted he was "fired once, RIF'd once, resigned once (not forced) and never coached a Division I player."

He also indicated that he was fortunate to have coached his three sons, Rob, Dave and John. He also observed there was a time when he and all three sons were head basketball coaches at the same time, while daughter Jennifer works as a teacher and cheer coach.

Irwin and his wife, Mary Ann, live in Warsaw. They enjoy seeing their children and 12 grandchildren. They especially enjoy watching their grandchildren play basketball and pursue their other activities.

Donna Sullivan

Donna Sullivan compiled a 344-241 record in 31 seasons as girls' basketball coach at Seymour High School, highlighted by a trip to the IHSAA State Finals in 1987.

Over the years, Sullivan's teams won 10 sectional titles and five regional championships in addition to a semistate crown in 1987. The Owls also captured two South Central Conference titles.

Sullivan was named IBCA District 5 Coach of the Year in 1986, was selected ICGSA District 5 Coach of the Year four times and was chosen as an honoree for Region 4 by the National High School Coaches Association in 1987. She also won an ICGSA Service Award in 2000, was the recipient of the NFHS Robert F. Kanaby Citizenship Award in 2001 and was presented a Virgil Sweet Award from the IBCA in 2004.

Sullivan was the Indiana All-Star head coach in 1989. She also was the All-Star assistant coach in 1982.

She describes her All-Star experience as well as the opportunity to guide so many wonderful young women as the top memories of her coaching career.

A 1966 graduate of Orleans High School, Sullivan attended Indiana University and earned her bachelor's degree in 1970. She began coaching at Seymour in the fall of 1970 and stayed there until retirement in 2001.

These days, Sullivan spends her time as a travel consultant, serving on the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame's women's committee and assisting the Waldron High School girls' basketball program. She notes she still very much enjoys teaching the game.

Sullivan lives in Seymour, and she was inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 2002.
